PASTOR'S POINTS

The value of warm thoughts



When I was a college student it seemed like February was always the coldest month of the year. Routinely there seemed to

be a blizzard or polar vortex that would dance around Lake Michigan leaving behind unimaginable snow drifts and icy walkways.

Trips to and from the dormitories for classes or even just to the dining hall felt like artic expeditions, with students either layering on their coats and scarfs or just embracing the cold and walking straight from their room in only a T-hirt, pair of shorts, and flip-flops. It was intriguing to me how those who arrived at their destination the most bundled up were always shivering and expressing how cold it was, all while those who appeared to be dressed for an afternoon at the beach were up and running, eager to start the next activity.

One year in particular it seemed extra bitterly cold out. The start of

the semester had even been pushed back because a number of students and faculty were physically unable to reach the campus. During the few extra days before the semester started, a group of students was circulating invitations to participate in a polar plunge. For those unfamiliar with a polar plunge, it more or less is picking an extremely cold day to jump into freezing water. Oftentimes this is attached to a fundraiser for someone in need. This time there was a classmate who, if I recall correctly, had a sibling with cancer. I agreed to participate in the event.

When I got there I was already very cold, and the thought of jumping into freezing Lake Michigan made me wonder if this was a safe choice. Yet I had made the commitment and I wanted to make sure I saw it through. A group of friends and I ran down together, right into the ice-tipped waves. The sensation was like hundreds of thousands of tiny little swords hitting one's skin, both invigorating and unbelievably painful all at the same time.

On the walk back to the dorms I thought I was going to die. One of those in my group who was a trained swimmer kept saying, "Just think warm thoughts." The more we talked, the more I was less focused on my freezing limbs and probably a little less focused on my body being in shock.

It seems a little silly to think that "thinking warm thoughts" could help. And yet, isn't it so very true that our mindset has a lot to do with how we not just enter into a situation but also how we move through each upcoming situation?

What are the thoughts we are holding close this day? Are they the kind that motivate us? Do they encourage us to move forward and lean into what might come next?

I pray that we all may be surrounded with warm thoughts. And by God's grace may we continue to pray for the wellbeing of all in our congregation, community and world.

2022 YOUTH GATHERING NEWS

Current 8th through 12th grade students: GATHERING REGISTRATION IS CURRENTLY PAUSED DUE TO THE CURRENT WAVE OF COVID-19 CASES.

Once we have more information from the ELCA Youth Gathering office, we will share with all of the participants.

We currently have 25 youth and adults from Tri-Church registered to attend the youth gathering together in July. Our plan is to travel the morning of July 23rd to Minneapolis. The gathering runs from July 24-28. Our group will return July 28th in the evening.

We will continue to fundraise to offset the cost of this trip. Many of our students applied for and received \$300 scholarships.

Our next "Getting Ready" meeting is Sunday, February 27th from 11:15am to 12:45pm at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Rock Falls. Lunch (pizza, cookies and water) will be provided.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

PASTOR'S REPORT

Funeral services were held for Dale Heuck on January 8th.

Confirmation classes have been moved to Zoom meetings for the month of January. There have not been enough students to hold classes in person. The hope is to return to in-person classes in February.

Pastor has been working with Nina to put together binders for council so materials are all together, as well as preparing for the Congregational Annual Meeting. With 26 needed, there should be enough in attendance for a quorum. The meeting will also be on Zoom for those who cannot attend in person.

Enough adults have signed up to supervise Youth Gathering; however, ELCA has frozen registrations due to the current surge of COVID-19 cases.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

TREASURER: Teri Holldorf will bring end-of-year figures to the annual meeting.

PROPERTY: The kitchen faucet, garbage disposal and cabinet floors have been replaced. Cleanup of old food, etc., is ongoing. Old blue choir robes are heavily faded and will likely need to be disposed of.

COMMUNICATIONS: Tri-Church received a thank-you note from Lutheran Social Services of Illinois. Tri-

Church provided gift cards, food and household items to 49 adults with disabilities who live in LSSI group homes, 58 seniors, 110 addicts, and 240 children and teens.

BUSINESS

There are no updates to current COVID-19 guidelines.

Two members are needed to attend Synod Assembly. The digital session will be June 5th and 12th, with an in-person session June 17-18.

Special offerings will be designated as follows:

The council approved a request from Dawn Zigler for \$61 for printed music. The money will come from the Harvey Johnson Memorial, which is designated for worship and music.

- Alice Davis and Barb O'Brien Memorials moved to the Youth account (designated for Sunday, Children, and YOuth and Family Ministry)
- Vera McCormick Memorial moved to Congregational Life account to use for gift baskets for shut-ins.

NURSE NOTES

Ask away

Facing a major procedure or surgery — or even just a checkup — may make you feel anxious or confused. Use these tips to more confidently approach a medical appointment, and to help your care team better meet your needs:

Plan ahead. Pause to think about what you want to get from the appointment. What are your goals? Write down and prioritize questions. Bring your list to the appointment and refer to it.

Engage in discussion and take notes. You can ask questions such as, "How will I receive results from this test?" "Why do you think that's the problem?" "Would you consider this treatment the best of my options?" and "Are there other options I should consider?" For clarification, summarize what you heard and then ask, "Am I understanding that right?"

Voice your concerns. If you're worried about anything — such as potential side effects or your ability to follow through with the treatment plan — voice them so that they can be addressed. You can ask for a follow-up appointment to talk further or seek a second opinion from another physician.

Call for backup. Consider bringing a trusted friend or family member with you. Let them know if and when you want them to speak up, take notes or leave the room during the appointment.

Follow up. Ask "What's the best way to get more information or ask questions after my visit?" That way, if you are confused or need more information, you can get answers.

Asking questions and raising concerns with your care team sets you up for success and enables your team to better care for you.
