# Setting a course in uncharted waters



When I was a parishioner in my home congregation, I remember participating in events, Bible studies, and worship,

all from what appeared to be a set vantage point. What I saw, I assumed, was the way it was. Difference of perspective seemed inconsequential; things were what they were and that was the "way it should be."

When I began to discern my call into ministry, I suddenly realized there was a different vantage point. Yet not just one other but several other vantage points. What once seemed so simple was now suddenly much more complex. Questions were no longer right or wrong, yes or no; they were opportunities to learn, stretch and grow into a fuller understanding.

For several weeks now an image has been on my mind. And every time I see it, my mind's eye is pulled to a different point of view.

Let's use our imagination for a moment. Picture a beach, a comfortable wind and sand beneath your feet.

The beach is full of familiar faces: some young, some old, some that you may have only passed in the grocery store.

Just a few feet from the edge of the water there is a sand castle. It is truly a sight to behold: high walls, smooth towers, detailed windows. It's clear there has been real time and dedication put into it. And from the look of those on the beach it seems each has at some point had a hand in building this mighty fortress.

There is just one thing: High tide is coming. Sure, some have seen those tides elsewhere. They know that the tide could do damage to the sand castle. Yet those other sand castles were "just too close to the water's edge to begin with." Surely this sand castle will not be washed away like some others have been.

Still others begin to wonder what might happen if the sand castle is this close. "What if high tide does begin to wash it away?"

Some of those on the beach seem torn by this predicament. "Surely that won't happen here!" Other voices say, "We should be ready."

Groups begin to form. Some want to build a moat to help deflect the rising tide. Others want to sure up the walls. Still others find boats on the shore, perhaps looking for a new beach or a new sandc astle, or perhaps to just follow where the sea will lead.

From each vantage point those on the beach believe they are in the right. After all, that is what they see. It is their own truth.

Regardless of the vantage point, one thing is certain: The tide is on the rise. The irony of it is even though each person is on the same beach, their individual vantage point leads each to accuse another of apathy.

It sounds like a no-win scenario, doesn't it? The faithful question becomes, "Why does there have to be winners or losers?" Just because each vantage point has value doesn't mean

We are planning to return to in-person Sunday School and Confirmation classes in September. Families: we want your input and feedback as we prepare to safely return for classes and children and youth programming at church.

### ST. JOHN'S/ST. PAUL YOUTH FUND

With larger youth events returning to the calendar, like the ELCA Youth Gathering next July and potentially Youth Quakes and retreats at LOMC, our youth account is becoming more active.

First, a special thank you to all who purchased coffee cakes this spring from St. John's and St. Paul students. The coffee cakes fundraiser, which netted almost \$1,000, will help to support 8th-12th graders from St. John's and St. Paul to attend the ELCA Youth Gathering in Minneapolis next summer.

Like the coffee cakes fundraiser, St. Paul and St. John's students and families participate in a variety of fundraisers that support larger youth events like the ELCA Youth Gathering that happens every three years, and the Youth Quake and Fall Youth Retreat at Lutheran Outdoor Ministries Center (LOMC) which happen each year.

Sometimes our youth fundraise for specific events like a Quake event or the Youth Gathering, and sometimes youth fundraisers are held to support all larger youth events. In addition to youth fundraisers like Palm Sunday breakfasts, doughnut sales and



coffee cake sales, the St. John's/St. Paul youth fund benefits from generous donations from members of both St. Paul and St. John's Lutheran churches.

Finally, both St. Paul and St. John's equally contribute an annual budgeted amount of money to support larger youth events. Depending on how successful youth fundraisers are each year, the joint youth fund has supported young people and their adult leaders attending large youth events by paying a small portion of fees for an event, half of the expense and even fully funding participants to attend events.

Due to the generous support of St. Paul and St. John's members and friends of each congregation and the hard work of our young people and their families, the joint youth ministries fund continues to support the faith formation of our young people.

Currently the fund stands at \$12,500. These funds are accumulated over a longer period and mostly support the ELCA Youth Gathering. Our next large event officially on the calendar is the ELCA Youth Gathering in Minneapolis next July. We are estimating

the cost per participant to be around \$1,000, and we project St. Paul and St. John's will have around 10-12 participants.



## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR STUDENTS IS AVAILABLE

Applications open July 22nd and close when all funds have been disbursed.

Adult leaders should apply on behalf of youth participants,

using the same five-digit congregational ID number used to register for the Gathering.

Financial assistance is available to youth participants only in the form of registration fee credits.

Assistance is offered based on the financial need of youth participants and their families, not the financial status of their congregations or local communities.

Up to \$300 per youth participant may be provided to cover registration fees. Financial assistance will appear as a credit on the congregational account.

Congregations may receive assistance for up to 10 youth.

Youth participants must be registered within 30 days of receiving financial assistance. After 30 days, assistance for unregistered youths is returned to the fund and awarded to the next person on the waiting list.

Contact Gerad at the church office if you are interested in applying for Youth Gathering financial assistance. If you receive ELCA financial assistance, this will offset your out-of-pocket expense for the gathering.

# Building healthy relationships

Healthy relationships can be a great source of support, comfort, and love. But when you're with someone day in and day out — which has especially been the case for many couples during the COVID-19 pandemic — it can be easy to grow irritated or take your partner for granted. Make your spouse or partner a priority by:

Listening. Put aside distractions such as your phone and turn off the television. Give your full attention to your partner's words and nonverbal cues. When the topic is complex, summarize what you've heard to make sure you understand. If your partner is describing a problem, focus on listening without planning what your next response will be. Don't rush in with solutions or stories of similar problems you've faced. Ask, "Do you want me to just listen, or should I help think of some solutions?"

**Complimenting.** Be mindful of what your partner does for you and your relationship. Then, let your partner know what you appreciate about him or her, whether oral or written. This may seem awkward at first but can become a natural habit over time.

Trying new things. Say yes if your partner asks you to try a new activity, even if it's out of your comfort zone. You may enjoy it more than you think. Even if it's not your favorite activity, it can be a way to show support, have new adventures and make memories.

Showing kindness. You can build trust and closeness with simple gestures of kindness, such as emptying the dishwasher, buying a small,unexpected gift, or giving a much-needed foot massage. Ask your partner what types of gestures he or she would most appreciate.

The PADS shelter has transitioned to year-round access for clients in need of shelter due to homelessness. In the past, Twin Cities PADS has operated from October through May.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT
