Goodbye to St. Paul & St. John's



We have been partners in children, youth and family ministries for 9 years together. And I've been with St Paul since the Spring

of 2011. I am humbled and honored to have served alongside the young people and adults of both congregations and with Tri Church confirmation and worship.

In January of this year, I was notified that St John's would no longer be able to financially support the position of Joint Children, Youth and Family Ministries Director. St. Paul is unable to support this position fulltime and is visioning a new direction for children, youth and family ministries. Therefore, my last day with St Paul and St John's will be June 30th.

It is with both sadness and hope that we part ways. I am sad that I'll no longer be able to continue worshipping with, learning with, serving with, praying with and celebrating with the youth and families of St Paul, St John's and Tri Church. During the past 11 years I have had a blast spending time with you and watching you grow in your faith. You have taught me what it means to truly BE the church. Please know that pastors and youth leaders come and go and sometimes that is hard. Also, know that God is always with you and loves you, and pastors and other adult leaders are here to support you and your parents or guardians to continue to grow in God's love by being present with you, listening to you, through worship, Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, youth events and activities, praying for you, and so much more.

Finally, thank you for allowing me to express my faith through music leadership in children and youth ministry, through worship in both congregations, and through our Tri Church online worship services. It is a joy for me to lead worship. I agree wholeheartedly with the words of Martin Luther, "Next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise." I have enjoyed working with so much talent in our congregations.

So, goodbye and God bless all. Please know it is my hope and prayer that God will continue to sustain, guide, and direct you on the journey. And, as people of the resurrection, we know this is really only goodbye, for now.

NURSE NOTES

Blister care

When a water blister develops, the first step is to avoid what caused it. Then, it's a matter of protecting the blister until your skin heals. However, if you have a condition that makes wound healing difficult, see your doctor.

If the blister isn't too painful, leave the fluid-filled bubble intact. Unbroken skin over a blister is a natural barrier to infection. Protect an intact blister by covering it with a bandage. If more protection is needed, cut a piece of thicker, cushioned padding (such as moleskin) into a doughnut shape and place the pad so it encircles the blister. The pad can then be covered by a breathable bandage.

- For a painful blister, you can drain the blister with these steps: •Clean—Wash your hands and the blister site with soap and warm water. Swab the blister area with rubbing alcohol or iodine, and sterilize a clean needle the same way.
- Puncture the blister—Using the sterilized needle, poke a few holes near the blister edge. Let the fluid drain, but keep the skin covering otherwise intact as a protective

barrier.


- Protect the blister—Apply an ointment such as petroleum jelly or zinc oxide and cover the blister with a bandage.
- Keep an eye on things—Check the blister each day for signs of infection and seek medical care if an infection appears to be developing. You can usually cut away the dead skin after a few days using a pair of sterilized tweezers and scissors.

Leaving home with faith

hen the pandemic hit in 2020, I was in Europe, separated for months from my family back in the United States. Even after I reunited with my husband and teenage and youngadult children in January 2021, we faced another separation that fall when my eldest child went away to college.

Though still in-state, she chose to live on campus, juggling classes and social life and facing opportunities to make both good choices and mistakes.

She calls and texts often. During one call in which she complained about a not-so-compatible roommate, I asked if she found her faith useful in resolving conflicts and living on her own. I hoped her answer would be a resounding "yes."

"No," she replied, "I don't think to myself, 'Let me use faith to solve my problems or find answers.' But some of what I do has traits of faith, what I learned in the church. I don't do anything because I think God will love me more or will be angry."

To be clear, she doesn't always make the best choices or treat her not-so-compatible roommate with the absolute love of Christ, but I think her faith helps her reset and try grace.

From her response I learned that, though church traditions may have impacted her life, her faith

community has made the larger impact. Over the years she has seen us give our "best reverent try" without fearing that God will turn away from us.

PRACTICES

- •Let your college student know that you're always available. Remind them often that you can connect on matters great and small or even pray together. We are just a phone call away.
- •Take care of mental and spiritual health. Many college campuses have resources to help students adjust to and cope with challenges away from home. Ask your student to familiarize themself with the campus ministry, even if they aren't ready to participate. Share their college address with your congregation; it may have a ministry of sending care packages to students. Most campuses have mental health clinics that offer a certain number of free sessions; urge your student to take advantage of these benefits if needed. If they are under a physician's care for mental health, ask if they need help keeping up with medication or appointments to stay on track.
- Engage in daily prayer. I say a daily prayer for my children, not for anything in particular but to give me peace of mind.
