PASTOR'S POINTS

The subtleness of the Holy Spirit



I recall a few years ago I was walking through a shopping center during the week after Christmas, and I overheard

the exchange of some store employees about the decorations. New Year's Day was just a few days away and this had one of the workers wondering if they should begin taking down the Christmas decorations. "Taking down Christmas decorations," I thought, "why take them down so soon?" There are 12 days of Christmas after all.

In our over-commercialized world where everything always seems to be advertised and sold a season in advance, it is easy to understand why those working in their store that day were ready to move on to the next event. I wonder sometimes if we ourselves get so wrapped up in things ahead of time that

when they do actually come, we've missed the celebration. Or perhaps have become tired from the pre-festivities to enjoy and be present for the main event.

Whatever the case may be, as the Christmas Season begins to fade into the Epiphany Season, it's my prayer that we all take pause and journey mindfully for those true epiphany moments. The Epiphany Season is full of Bible stories that relay moments where those in the story become aware of God's very presence with them. As such, these stories provide for us an opportunity to reflect on those moments that God has been present with us as well.

I truly do believe that every day there are moments all around us that point to the Holy Spirit at work. Sometimes those moments can feel very big and apparent like when a person walks away from a horrific accident without injury, other times those moments can be a bit more subtle. To be honest, I think God

much prefers the subtleness of the Holy Spirit. There is something beautiful about the awe and wonder of how God is at work in the often-unseen that I believe also provides encouragement to be part of the Lord's work in the world.

I'm curious to hear about your epiphany moments over the coming days and weeks of this new year. Where and how are you experiencing God's presence? Were you able to notice it in that moment or was it sometime later that you became aware of the Lord in that moment?

Lord, may this new year fill us all with a sense of joy and wonderment at your presence that, encouraged by your presence, we may be energized to be bold in sharing your good news and compassionate presence. Amen.

A blessing for the new year and each day

Recently, it was my son's baptismal anniversary. As a pastor, you may expect that we light the baptismal candle every year and make a big deal of marking this occasion. But often it slips in as a secondary thought, which was the case this year.

His baptismal anniversary fell in the middle of the week amid homework, meal preparation and scheduled activities, so I was relieved that I at least remembered to say, "Today's your baptismal anniversary, buddy!" while we were eating supper.

My mom happened to be visiting and told my son, "Your mom can put the sign of the cross on your forehead." He wasn't quite as enthusiastic. "She does that every night," he said, and continued eating.

This made me chuckle, as well as reflect. On one hand, his baptismal anniversary is significant, but I also want him and his sister to know that their baptism is a daily reality. That's why, although there are many things I lose track of as a parent and many ways I fall short each day, I try to remember to bless each of our kids when I tuck them in at night. "God made you special and we love you very much," I say as I mark the sign of the cross on their foreheads.

It's not much, but what I want my kids to learn through this simple bedtime ritual is that God is with them and loves them—no matter what. As their parent, I'd love to be

able to protect them from cruelty and harm. Despite this natural inclination, I know how impossible that is.

That's why what I really want is for them to have tools to handle the yuck and muck of life when it happens. The way I see it, that's what the blessing of baptism offers. The promise of our baptism reminds us that God has claimed us as God's own and is with us each day. It reminds us of who we are and where our worth is found. Regardless of the words we use or how often we do so, whenever we remind our kids (and ourselves) of this promise, it's well worth it.

Honey to calm a cough

You probably already know that antibiotics don't work to treat viral illnesses such as colds and coughs, and research suggests that some nonprescription cough and cold medications — such as antihistamines alone — or cough medicines — such as dextromethorphan (Delsym) — may not work very well either. So what else can you try?

According to an article in BMJ Evidence-Based Medicine that looked at 14 studies, honey might be a good option. The review found that in studies comparing honey to common treatments such as diphenhydramine (Benadryl), dextromethorphan and medicinal syrups, honey did a better job at decreasing cough frequency and severity in upper respiratory tract infections such as colds, coughs and flu-like sickness.

However, the authors noted many differences among the studies. For example, some used honey and other syrups or honey with coffee. Many of the studies were also relatively small. The authors recommended that more large, high-quality studies be conducted. Even so, this review is not the first publication to point to honey's benefits.

For example, the American College of Chest Physicians has said that honey may relieve acute cough in children over 1 year old. Don't give honey to a child younger than 1, as this can result in infant botulism, a rare but serious condition.

And as the BMJ review points out, honey is relatively inexpensive, widely available and generally safe. Though honey is mostly sugar, it also contains a mix of amino acids, vitamins, minerals, iron, zinc and antioxidants.
