Youth & Family Ministries news

SERVE BOLDLY IN MILWAUKEE, WI

YOU have the opportunity to serve boldly and grow in Milwaukee this summer, June 18-23!

Serve Boldly provides teenagers with the opportunity to accompany and serve their neighbor while deepening an understanding of God's presence in their lives. We would spend time serving in a variety of ways each day with games, worship, fun and more throughout the week!

Service Work: Each day we will go to different worksites, working with a variety of youth and adults who are at Serve Boldly. The work sites are picked in response to the needs of the community and are finalized in May. Work sites may include and are not limited to the following:

- Hope Ministries—A local church in West Allis that has a food & clothing closet.
- The Gathering Community Meal Program—Meals are served each week across four Milwaukee locations.
- COA Youth & Family Center— Youth will participate in summer program and maintenance projects.
- Victory Garden Initiative—Youth will clean up, harvest, and care for the gardens.
- Feeding America Wisconsin— Youth will spend time sorting or preparing food in their Milwaukee warehouse.
- Urban Ecology Center—Youth will assist with summer programming and interact with participants.

 Vacation Bible School —Youth will assist in leading VBS at an area congregation.

Housing: We will be sleeping on air mattresses that we bring with us at Luther Memorial Church in West Allis. Typically, there are quiet hours for sleeping from 10:30 pm to 7 am daily.

Showers: Shower time is offered after each day of service at the local YMCA. This facility has a Family Locker Room with 4 private shower rooms that are ADA accessible that will be available for all the guys and anyone else who would like to use them and two

locker rooms for gals—a Girls Room for those under 17 yrs that has 8+ curtained stalls and a Women's Locker Room for 18+ yrs has 5 curtained stalls. The YMCA requires the name and birthdate of each participant for a simple background screening for anyone 16 years and older.

Food: Typically there is a Hot Breakfast option each day—Ex: french toast sticks, oatmeal, or breakfast burritos AND Cold Breakfast options of bread, bagels, fruit, cereal, mild, juices, peanut butter, cream cheese, etc. Lunches will be comprised of the sack lunch you assemble in the morning that may include: a sandwich, chips or crackers, fruit and/or veggie and dessert. There is also a post work

day pre-dinner snack daily. Dinner each night includes a salad bar with a main entrée that will vary by the day. Options include but are not limited to: cheesy chicken, pizza, BBQ sandwiches,,tacos, and an evening out for dinner at an area eatery or Food Truck. Theywill strive to accommodate any dietary

restrictions that are communicated by May 1.

Safety: All staff, adults and participants who are 18 are screened through an online background check system. A link is sent to those individuals and it is all completed online.

Evening Activities:

There are activities

each evening—options include but are not limited too:

- Sprecher Brewery: No trip to Milwaukee would be complete without learning about the brewing culture of the city. Not only will we get to see the brewing facilities at Sprecher, but we will get to taste their legendary soda.
- Chill on the Hill: Our visit to Humboldt Park features live music, food vendors, and plenty of park space to relax.
- Lake Michigan is a major part of Milwaukee. We will not swim, but spend an evening at a park overlooking the lake.
- Harley Davidson: Our tour of the museum will give you a chance to engage in this major



aspect of Milwaukee history and culture. Don't worry, it is far from a stuffy museum – we promise you'll have fun!

Possible Brewers Game prior to Serve Boldly: The Brewers play the Pirates at 2:10 p.m. on June 18th. There is a possibility of taking in the game as we head to Serve Boldly.

Expenses: The trip cost for Serve Boldly is \$360 plus travel, travel meals, any souvenirs, and the Brewer Game. Each congregation is handling the funding differently. See your pastor for details.

NURSE NOTES

Healthy hearts, longer lives linked to olive oil

People living in nations that border the Mediterranean Sea tend to live longer, healthier lives, likely due to a large part to a diet that has been linked to lower rates of heart disease and stroke. A new study found that people in the U.S. who consume healthy amounts of olive oil, a central component in the Mediterranean diet, enjoy similar benefits, especially when it comes to preventing deaths caused by cardiovascular disease.

Researchers at Harvard University looked at diet logs and health outcomes for 92,000 nurses and doctors involved in a study that stretched 28 years. Those with the highest average daily consumption of olive oil — whether eaten on foods or used when cooking foods — had a 19% lower risk of dying of any cause —

than those with the lowest consumption. Even more pronounced, the high consumers had a 29% lower risk of dying of brain disorders such as Alzheimer's or Parkinson's disease.

Mayo Clinic experts say that the study — while not definitive in regard to the benefits of the Mediterranean diet, in which olive oil is a key component. Olive oil is a monounsaturated fat, which can lower total cholesterol and low density lipoprotein (LDL, or "bad") cholesterol levels. Nuts and seeds also contain monounsaturated fats. So do other plant-based oils, such as canola oil, peanut oil, safflower oil and sesame oil.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

PASTOR'S REPORT

- Pastor reported the death of Jeffry Tupper on 12/11/22. Services were held on Dec 17, 2022.
- Joyce Preston passed away on December 27, 2022. Services were held Jan 5, 2023
- Children's Christmas program went well. Thank-you to the Sunday School teachers, helpers, and the students that helped guide the younger students for the extra work to make this a success.
- Christmas Eve Barn service was canceled due to the weather. Howard Janssen and Joan Harm have both expressed the desire to help next year.
- With the cancelation of the Barn Service they were able to pivot and provide 2 services at St. John's on Christmas Eve.
- Because of the uniqueness of Christmas falling on a Sunday we did have a Christmas Day service.
- The last collaborative Tri-Church Online Worship was broadcast on Jan. 1, 2023. The service was a lessons and carols service.
- January 1, 2023 also marked the first test broadcast of the new Livestreaming equipment.
- •St. John's youth have no one attending the Dells Youth Quake due to conflicts of the scheduling.
- There are plans in the works for a Mission/Service Camp this summer for Jr/Sr High youth. The event is called Serving Boldly in Milwaukee WI on June 18-23, 2023. Youth included will be from Immanuel, St. Paul, First Christian and St. John's. This event will be a great opportunity since our youth were unable to attend the Quake and since UNITE Service Camp has ended it's previous functioning.
- Meeting is coming up for Community VBS for planning on 2/20/2023. VBS will be held 7/16/2023 and 7/23/2023 for the community service at the Grandon Center.
- Tri-Church group is looking for participants from each of the congregations. The next meeting will be Jan 23, 2023 at 6:00 p.m. at St. Paul's.
- •The season of Lent starts on Ash Wednesday 2/22/2023. After much conversation with Wednesday night worshippers and other members of the congregation, St. John's will not be participating in the Tri-Church mid-week collaboration this year. - The Congregational Resourcing Event will be held at Sauk Valley College on March 4, 2023. With how geographically close CRE is this year Pastor hopes there will be more interest and participation in this event.
- Pastor has begun conversations with the confirmation students and their families about a Spring date for the Confirmands Affirmation of Baptism. More info coming.
